You will occasionally hear ministers grumble about the little item commonly known as the “sermon blurb” -- those little descriptions of our sermons that go into church newsletters and onto web sites, and occasionally into the local paper or on the church “marquee.” We don’t always know what we’re going to preach about, but we know that folks occasionally make their decision about whether or not to come to church based on the sermon title. Because it’s 2:00 in the morning, I’ve been home from Guatemala for a mere twelve hours, and because I have several options for the worship service on Feb. 11th but no clear plan. So, my dear church, no sermon title that day. Let’s call it “Come To Church Anyway.”

Prison Ministry

February 11th –

Second Sunday collection for Partakers

For several years First Parish has been involved in a prison ministry, College Behind Bars, coordinated by Partakers. Many members of our church visit regularly with the three prisoners we currently sponsor. Our church, through your generosity, pays for the three pre-qualifying correspondence courses that prove the student's ability and dedication to the program. Then, as the student works on the four-year liberal arts degree through Boston University, we visit, correspond, and encourage. BU supplies the professors and pays for the college classes and textbooks in full. Partakers, an advocacy and volunteer training service, is committed to the rehabilitation and education of incarcerated men and women whose chances of succeeding, once they leave prison, increase exponentially if they have a college degree. Recidivism (returning to prison) for the general prison population is about 66%. For individuals with a four-year degree, the recidivism rate is only 1% to 11%. These educated prisoners often serve as teachers and tutors, examples, and role models when they return to society. Massachusetts has one of eight remaining college prison programs nation wide – down from a high of 350 at one time. Of all crime prevention methods, education is the most cost effective.

On Sunday, January 28, we welcomed and were inspired by Richard Smith, who shared his personal experience of nearly ten years of incarceration. Richard, who currently works for Partakers, along with Mea Allen, Partaker's

Volunteer coordinator, and Lanny Kutakoff, Executive Director, met after church with our Partaker teams and with others who may wish to volunteer as either a team member or as a tutor. If you were unable to attend, but would like to be a part of this prison ministry, please contact Sue Robinson. On February 11th we will dedicate our Second Sunday collection to Partakers to support the work of this non-profit organization.

Religious Education at First Parish

From the DRE,

The other day I picked up a new history of vegetarianism called The Bloodless Revolution by Tristram Stuart and have been completely engrossed in it since. It begins in the 17th Century with various religious, political and cultural critics who embraced vegetarianism for numerous reasons including, in what is a main theme of the book, a fascination with Hindu Brahmins from India who they associated with the Greek Philosopher Pythagoras, and saw as highly moral in their refusal to eat "flesh". Often eccentric and single minded in their views, these pioneering Western vegetarians were routinely reviled, marginalized and ridiculed. As often happens, however, their sincerity and the real moral concerns that they raised had an impact on the thinking of the larger society.

At the same time, each morning I spend some time with the Bible and, recently, Emerson's Journals. This morning, Emerson talks about the virtues of "enthusiasts" or those who hold and practice what is seen by the larger society as extreme or exaggerated views, or are one-issue advocates. Though very aware of the dangers of "enthusiasm" (he was, after all, a good sober New Englander) he praises their positive influence by saying that often what they advocate become the accepted norms of society. Each grain of truth promoted by enthusiasts, according to Emerson, enlarges and enriches the mind of the population and promotes our virtue.

It strikes me that the great value of Unitarian Universalist religious education is its effort to take from a tremendous variety of sources, truths that give us a worldview that promotes virtue in its highest sense. In any given week, our children and all our parishioners are examining a staggering range of ideas and seeking to enlarge our "angle of vision" and deepen our spiritual, intellectual and social views. No small task, but the very thing of life.
