LISE'S LETTER

On Sunday I preached about the high expectations of the holiday season, and how the story of Jesus' birth, and all the anticipations that go along with it can set us up for stress and/or failure. I cautioned that we need to be careful of the stories we tell one another because they can shape our reality for good or bad. Despite all this, maybe because of it, I find myself humming 'Let Christmas Come' from our gray hymnal.

*Let Christmas come, its story told, when days are short and winds are cold;
Let Christmas come, its lovely song, when evening's soon and night is long.
Let Christmas come, its great star glow, on quiet city parks of snow;
Let Christmas come, its table gleam, love born again: the truth of dream.*

I'm humming this song because I truly love the Christmas story, especially when we put our UU spin on it that every night a child is born is a holy night. Hope is needed in our world as encouragement for us all to believe that we can do better. But then, to help keep myself from getting too frenzied about all the work there is to do for the holiday season, and the world, for about the past decade, I've also added the Pagan perspective into my own interior celebration. Remembering that there are cycles and seasons to life is extremely helpful. Knowing and appreciating that there are fallow times for our natural world and that it is okay, even necessary, to take a break reassures and calms me. Making time for rituals like enjoying the holiday lights, relaxing in candle or firelight with a cup of something warm and tasty, and sitting on my porch to watch the morning wake up all help reinforce the importance of letting time rest and being still. The sun will rise again, whether I'm out there doing a sun dance, or not. 😊

Another thing I like to do, which involves a time of quiet and happy contemplation, is to reflect gratefully on all the wonderful things I know that are already happening in the

world—especially with regard to the culture of First Parish of Norwell. People are building houses for humanity, tutoring homeless children, acting as big brothers, sisters and trans-siblings, knitting scarves for children in Mexico, buying Christmas presents for foster children, writing their legislators and sending postcards, volunteering to read for the vision impaired, taking action to save our planet, and doing the work of our church in so many ways! First Parish is blessing the world and I'm so grateful to be a part of all that we do.



FROM THE PARISH COMMITTEE CHAIR

“WE ARE UU!” You may have noticed these words on this Spire’s front page inside a green rectangle. This slogan, which you may expect to see pop up in various places in the days ahead, is a helpful reminder to all regarding who we are. The Parish Committee has recently recommitted ourselves to ensure that we reflect our Unitarian Universalist values and principles. We encourage FPNUU members to join us in this commitment.

Member congregations, like ours, covenant to affirm and promote our Seven Principles (please click on this link for a refresher: <https://i.pinimg.com/originals/0c/ab/5f/0cab5f7ed33f910e0ca2bc4601b01960.jpg>). We live out these Principles within a “living tradition” of wisdom and spirituality, drawn from sources as diverse as science, poetry, scripture, and personal experience. As Rev. Barbara Wells ten Hove explains, “The Principles are not dogma or doctrine, but

rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in Unitarian Universalist religious communities.”

We are very proud to be Unitarian Universalists! We should encourage each other to live out and demonstrate our shared Principles. Sometimes our values can become politicized by other groups (climate change or racial injustice, for instance) which can then make our members feel like we are becoming *too* political. However, we can't desert our values. We need to remember the long history of Unitarian Universalism participating in social justice activities at *all* levels of society. Unitarian Universalist principles encourage the right of conscience and utilizing the democratic process to achieve social justice, equity, and equal opportunity for all individuals in our local, national, and global communities. At First Parish of Norwell, we support individual and group efforts to bring about a world where no person is denied the right to participate and enjoy the fruits of a just and equitable society.

One way to display our UU values, visually, is in our exterior church signage. You may have noticed some written announcements recently regarding sign posting in front of our church. The Parish Committee will review all sign requests to make sure they properly reflect our Unitarian Universalist values, as interpreted through our Principles and Sources. We intend to rotate messages on these signboards and would certainly welcome suggestions from the congregation. Brief quotes and other sayings that reflect our UU values for signage may be submitted to me via email at lestaylor@me.com.

In addition, the Parish Committee is planning to have a new banner created for the north side of our church for 2018, as we wind down our church's historic 375th year. Finally, we are also considering a return of a “wayside pulpit” (a permanent outdoor bulletin board) like we use to have out front, in a new location on church property along River Street. This would display upcoming sermon

titles, uplifting quotations and other pertinent FPNUU information.

We welcome your ideas in how we may better share our UU values within our church and amongst our neighboring communities. Please feel free to contact me or any of the other members of the Parish Committee (listed on page 2 of this newsletter).

Since there wasn't enough room in this month's column to resume the discussion from last month's Spire article regarding committee chair tasks and running successful committee meetings, please look for that in January's Spire. Until then, have a blessed season and happy holidays to all!

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NEWS

Hello First Parish,

It's hard to believe that the advent banners are hung, the wreaths ordered, and the holiday fair all packed up for next year! It seems as though we were just planning our Water Communion and here we are heading into the new year. I've learned so much in the last few months and I thank you all for being part of that!

Sunday school classes are moving along nicely with a continued focus on social justice issues. Topics have included discussions of social activists and changemakers from the past, such as Harriet Tubman. Children have been working to generate their own ideas of social action and have completed several projects, including a toy drive for Cradles 2 Crayons and laminated placemats decorated with children's artwork for food pantries. Our goal has been to give students the opportunity to collaborate together to identify areas of need, plan, organize, and implement (with

adult support, of course!). The spirit of the holiday season in our society can often be overshadowed by commercialism and receiving gifts and toys. Having an opportunity to reflect on the needs of others will hopefully help to establish some balance and highlight the importance of giving and gratitude. Students continue to dig deeper into the UU principles, reading stories, completing activities, and engaging in thoughtful discussions each week as well. Following their visit to Messiah Baptist church in Brockton, the Neighboring Faiths class then dug deeper into Judaism. Topics have included: the foundation of the Old Testament as the root of Jewish teachings; contrasts with Christianity; holidays; and pertinent geography. The group visited Sha'aray Shalom in Hingham to gain more insight into the Jewish faith through experiential learning. As always, we are so thankful to our neighboring faith communities for welcoming us and helping our children to gain a deeper understanding of religious diversity. Youth Group attended a CON in Westminister, RI. Youth Group continues to meet every two weeks with teens from Cohasset, Scituate, and Rockland. They are currently planning a CON of their own and getting ready for their Secret Santa event. Several youth group teens and older children from our RE program helped to support the efforts of the Holiday Fair and will assist in shopping for gifts for foster children in early December.

We are in the process of planning for RE mini-sessions in January and February and we need the support of First Parish parishioners! We can't do it without you! Do you have an interest, talent, or passion that you would like to share with the children? Please consider leading a 30-45 minute session on a Sunday. You do not need to be a teacher or a professional anything. This is a no-pressure experience meant to bring more members of our community together. Ideas for mini-sessions are limitless, but I have listed a few to get us started! Please connect with me at if you have any questions at all or if you would like to help with this important program.


A CHRISTMAS INVITATION
